Butterflies

Butterflies are invertebrates - that is, unlike animals they don't have a backbone.

There are about 17,500 butterfly species in the world with 400 in Australia.

The caterpillars of the endangered **Bathurst Copper Butterfly** only

eat the leaves of one species of the Blackthorn plant. This is not a wise survival plan.

Also known as the Purple Copper Butterfly, it has a wing span of only 20mm - which is about the width of a ten cent coin.

The Cairns Birdwing Butterfly (not shown here) is Australia's largest butterfly with a wing span of up to 150mm - which is about the width of a page of this book.

The four stages of a butterfly's life are egg, caterpillar, pupa (*pew-pa*) and adult butterfly.

The pupa is enclosed in a chrysalis (*cris-al-is*).

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Look for caterpillars and watch how they change into chrysalises or cocoons, and if you're lucky, see them emerge as butterflies or moths.

But don't touch them as they are fragile.
